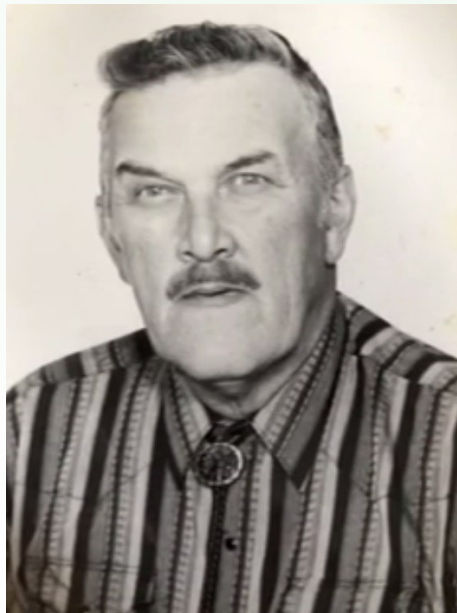

A Tribute to Don Brown

The Cooperative family suffered a great loss on Thursday, January 26, 2023, with the passing of retired Oneida-Madison Lineman turned General Manager, Don Brown.

In 1965, just days after his 23rd birthday, Don joined the Cooperative as an apprentice lineman. Displaying his strong work ethic and dedication to the membership, Don soon became Line-Foreman. During his time as Foreman, Don oversaw many large projects, including the building of our Fenner Substation. In 1986, Oneida-Madison Electric Cooperative Board of Directors tapped Mr. Brown to fill the role of General Manager. Transitioning from the field to the office Don continued to take on many notable projects as the Cooperative grew. Don was contributory in the relocation of the Oriskany Falls substation, both increasing capacity and improving reliability. After 31 years of service to the Cooperative Don retired in 1996 leaving an impressive list of accomplishments for himself, his family, and the Cooperative. During his tenure at Oneida-Madison, Don saw a vast expansion of territory and membership, climbing from 669 to 1611 active electric services. Mr. Brown was instrumental in shaping the amazing organization your Cooperative is today. Even while enjoying his retirement, Don continued to serve the membership. Don, with his band, the Blue Valley Boys, were often the entertainment at the annual meetings. Attending annual meetings and stopping into our Bouckville office right up until his passing, Don kept watch over the Cooperative he worked so hard to help build.

On behalf of the entire national, New York, and local Co-op family, we thank you, Mr. Brown, you will be greatly missed.

Please take note of the due date on your bill, as it varies from month to month.

When mailing payments, mail ahead to allow enough time for the postal service to deliver them before the due date to avoid a penalty being applied to your account. A 1.5% penalty is applied the day following the due date if payment is not received.

Payments can be dropped off at the office either during business hours, or anytime in our drop box on the front of the building. They can also be made over the phone or online.

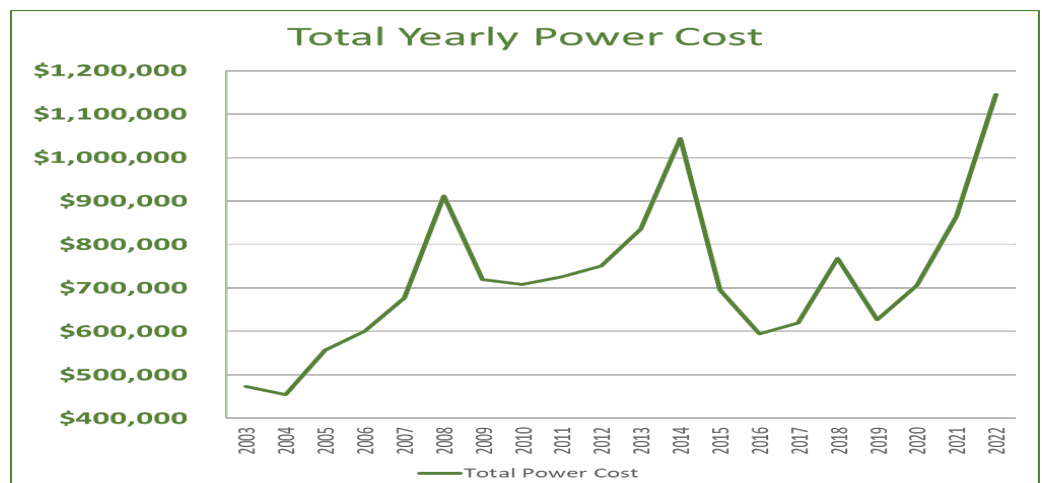
OMEC Rate Increase Goes Into Effect in April 2023

Below is a chart depicting the rate increase that was voted on by the Board of Directors on December 20, 2022. These increases will go into effect for April's usage which will be in your May 28th billing statement.

Rising Trend in Power Costs

OMEC power costs in 2003 were approximately \$470,000, steadily rising to \$911,000 in 2008. Prices declined but only to \$700,000 in 2010 before starting to climb again, peaking at over 1 million dollars in 2014. Power cost returned to the \$600,000 mark and again began to escalate. We ended 2022 with a purchased power cost of 1.15 million dollars.



How to Keep Energy Costs at a Minimum

With the rising costs of just about everything these days, it's a no-brainer to cut corners where we can to save money. Some costs cannot be helped but when it comes to your electric use, there are some key steps you can take to lower your bill.

- **Avoid “peak-usage” times**— we tend to use the most electricity from 4-9pm after we've come home from work or school. Like the supply and demand lesson from your high school economics class, the more energy people are using at one time causes demand to go up, and with that, the price. Try doing laundry in the early morning or late evening or use a crockpot to cook dinner instead of the oven.
- **Beware of energy “vampires”**- some appliances draw energy even when not in use, accounting for upwards of 15% of your bill. Make sure to unplug toasters, phone chargers, coffee pots and the like when you're not using them.
- **Become more energy efficient**—keep heating vents unobstructed by furniture and debris, caulk around windows and doors, change air filters regularly, and replace old and inefficient appliances with Energy Star rated ones. And don't forget about our Energy Efficiency Rebate! If you purchase an approved Energy Star rated appliance, fill out one of our short rebate applications and include a copy of your receipt to get up to \$400 credited to your OMEC account! - **Take small steps to decrease your energy usage**— turning your thermostat down a couple degrees during the winter can make a huge difference! Invest in a programmable thermostat and set it to turn the heat down when you're not home. And in the warmer months, remember fans cool people, not rooms, so be sure to turn them off when you leave. Switch to LED lightbulbs; changing out just 5 lightbulbs can save \$45/year.

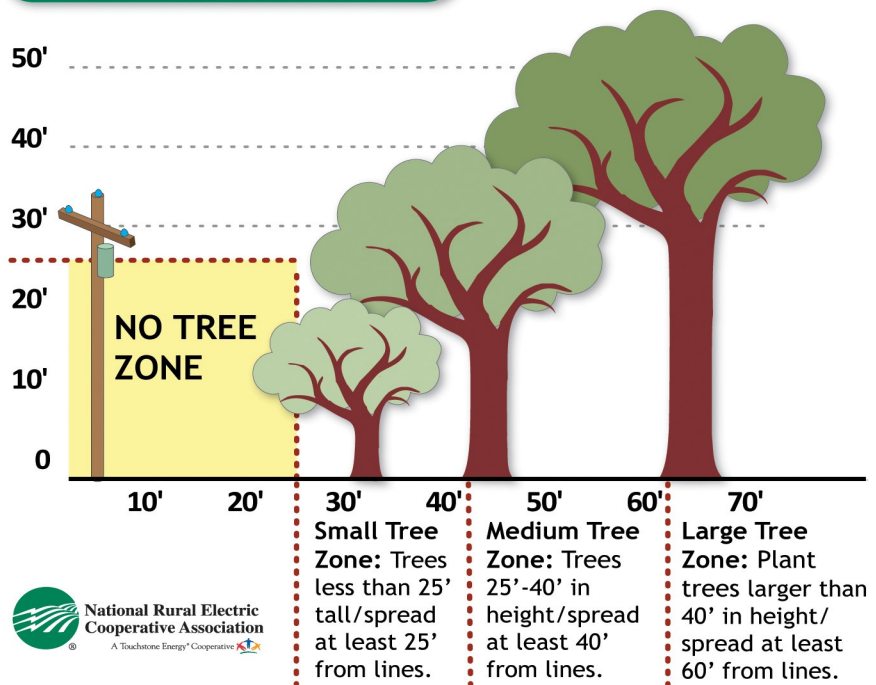

Being a lineworker is the 10th most dangerous occupation in the United States! That's why during an outage, we ask for your patience. While we want to get the power on as soon as possible, we also want our crew to take their time and do the job right for your safety and theirs!



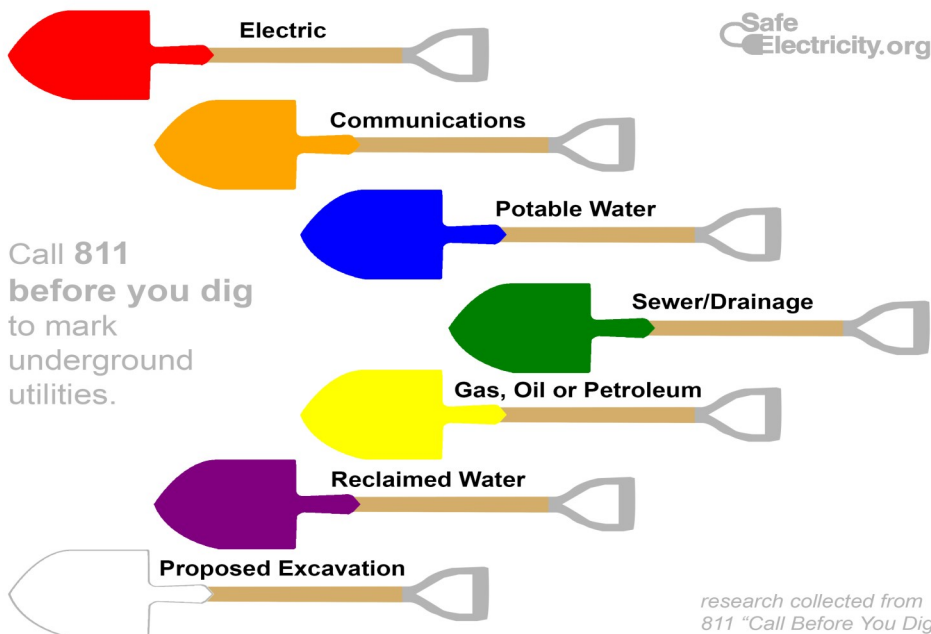

Call before you dig.**

At Home with Hazel

This velvety soup is rich in flavor and made with locally-found ramps also known as wild onions. If you're not a forager, leeks or even yellow onions, make good substitutions.

Bacon, Potato, and Ramp **Soup**

Prep time: 20 mins **Cook time:** 40 mins

Ingredients

Soup:

2-3 heads of garlic, plus enough olive oil to drizzle over heads before baking

4 Tbsp butter

1 Tbsp olive oil

2 C thinly sliced ramps, leeks, or onions

3 lbs. potatoes

4 C chicken stock

1/4 C white wine

2 tsp fresh thyme

6-8 slices of cooked bacon, crumbled

1/4 C sour cream

1 C half and half

Salt & pepper to taste

Garnish:

Fresh parsley (optional)

Olive oil drizzle

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 400°. Trim 1/2" off the top of the heads of garlic, exposing all the cloves inside and drizzle with olive oil. Wrap heads in foil and bake 40-45 minutes or until cloves are soft.
2. Heat a 2-quart pot over medium heat and add butter & olive oil, stir 'til melted. Add ramps and potatoes and cook, stirring occasionally, until they have begun to soften and brown slightly, about 6-8 minutes.
3. Add chicken stock, white wine, roasted garlic, thyme, salt & pepper. Stir to combine, scraping up any stuck bits from the bottom of the pan. Bring mixture to a boil, then turn heat down to a bubbling simmer. Cook until potatoes are tender, about 20-25 mins
4. When potatoes are soft, puree soup using an immersion blender, or in batches using a regular blender & return to the pot. Add bacon, sour cream, and half & half. Warm on medium heat for five minutes and serve garnished with a drizzle of olive oil and chopped parsley.

Notes:

1. You can use any kind of potato, but Yukon golds, red, and fingerling potatoes work best.
2. If you don't have white wine on hand, or prefer not to use it, just use more chicken stock.
3. When adding garlic, just squeeze from the bottom of the head and the garlic will come out in a paste-like consistency.
4. If you prefer a chunkier consistency, remove a couple cups of potatoes before blending and then add them back in after you've pureed the rest.
5. Serve with a green salad and crusty bread.
